Service Award

Jim Seeley Award

Created in honor of Jim Seeley (OISC Council Member 2015-2018), former Executive Director of the Wild Rivers Coast Alliance, this award is presented to an individual or group who has demonstrated leadership at the local or regional level and beyond through collaborative efforts to protect cultural, natural, and economic resources from invasive species. Robert has been instrumental in protecting Oregon's natural landscapes for many years, his leadership on the Emerald Ash Borer Task Force and his tireless efforts to involve the local community in responding to this invasive species earned him this special commendation.

Sandra Denyes Diedrich Award

Created in honor of Sandy Diedrich, the founder of the Forest Park Ivy Removal Project (No Ivy League), this award is presented to the person or organization making the most outstanding contribution to protecting Oregon from invasive species. This year the Council has chosen to recognize Dr. Sylvia Yamada's extensive efforts focused on understanding one of Oregon's most potentially destructive species, the green crab.





Industry Partner Award

This award is presented to the private industry individuals or company that has made a significant difference in protecting Oregon from invasive species.
