THE EARLY YEARS

The OISC was created by the 2001 Legislature for a "coordinated and comprehensive effort" to prevent introduction and spread of invasive species.

Key Activities:

Coordination, Building Awareness, and Identifying Gaps

OISC MISSION & Duties (ORS 570.755)

To protect Oregon's natural resources and economy by planning and leading a coordinated and comprehensive campaign to prevent the introduction of invasive species and eradicate, contain or manage existing invasive species in Oregon through the Council's:

- → Early detection reporting systems
- → Educational outreach to diverse stakeholders, decision makers and general public
- Statewide plan to prevent introduction and spread of invasives
- Grant/loan program for educational and eradication projects.



EMERGENCY CONTROL ACCOUNT

The Oregon Invasive Species Control Account (Emergency Control Account) was established in 2010 and can be administered for the eradication or control of new or expanding infestations of invasive species that threaten the health and integrity of Oregon's native flora and fauna.
